What is a right to counsel?

- Government commitment / established in the law
- Publicly funded
- Ensures attorney for all eligible litigants
- Full representation (*not triage)

Basic human needs cases: shelter, sustenance, health, safety, child custody, & more as defined locally (but *NOT* all civil cases). ABA Resolution 112A provided guidance.

Low-income litigants (exceptions: mental health, evictions, children)



CRTC justifications

- Basic human needs at stake (civil cases <u>not</u> less important than criminal cases)

Effectiveness of representation

Providing equity and faith in proceedings where other side is represented:

Financial benefits of providing counsel

- O Overall: ¾ of all civil cases have at least one unrepresented party
- O Evictions representation rate: LLs 81%, tenants 3%
- O Race equity
- Change in behavior of system actors
- Increasing tenant power



Right to Counsel Justifications

Avoiding unnecessary costs

national eviction cost projection



The total cost of eviction for The United States is \$315,528,616,180. This includes the following costs:

- Cost of providing emergency shelter = \$134,761,200,000
- Cost of providing inpatient medical care = \$74,604,131,700
- Cost of providing emergency room care = \$47,883,673,600
- Cost of providing child welfare services = \$4,781,784,960
- Cost of juvenile delinquency = \$53,497,825,920



Metrics from RTC jurisdictions

San Francisco

- o Filing rate decreased by 10% from 2018 to 2019*
- o ~60% of tenants w/full rep able to stay in homes*

NYC

- o 84% of represented tenants remain in their homes**
- o Filings down 30% b/n) 2013-2019***
- o **Defaults down 34%** b/n 2013-2019***

Metrics from RTC jurisdictions

BOULDER*

63% avoided eviction (26% increase)

KANSAS CITY**

In Jackson County, pre-RTC eviction rate was 99% and in first 3 months of RTC it's < 20%

CLEVELAND***

- 93% avoided eviction or involuntary move; and 83% seeking additional time to move got it
- Of 21% of clients unaware of rental assistance at time they contacted Legal Aid, ~98% wanted rental assistance and Legal Aid helped 81% of those clients obtain it
- 92% of clients who wanted addt'l time to move, and 97% who sought monetary relief, were able to get it. (NOTE: 42% did not want to remain in home)
